MOSES LAKE - The 557 is riding the rails again MOSES LAKE — The 357 is froing the rails again in a painting designed to help raise money for her restoration. The Engine 557 Restoration Company has made 557 prints of the painting, print No. 1 was presented Tuesday to Karen Rimple, the daughter of former 557 owner Monte Holm.

MOSES LAKE - A man who thought he was meeting a woman for a date was reportedly robbed at gunpoint early Tuesday morning in Moses Lake. About 2:30 a.m., the victim went to meet with Ciarra

L. Webb, 19, of Moses Lake, at a home in the 1800 block of West Crouse Street. The two reportedly met online and the victim believed he was meeting Webb for a date, according to police reports

Port of Moses Lake to purchase land

600 acres from Reclamation

MOSES LAKE - The Port of Moses Lake is set to acquire more than 600 acres of land from the Bureau of Reclamation, as commissioners approved a \$324,000 purchase agreement with the agency this week.

The port has been working with Reclamation for the past year and a half to purchase the land, which will be used for their wastewater facilities expansion project. Port Executive Director Pat Jones said the additional

land is necessary for the land application portion of their wastewater operations.

Since the late 1990s, industrial wastewater has made its way from users to a 27-million-gallon storage pond on the port's Northwest corner until growing season, when it would be applied to nearby land.

Users of the system over the years include Chemi-Con, Moses Lake Industries, the U.S. Forest Service, SGL and Genie. However, SGL has since added another plant building and broken ground on a third one and new tenant AstaReal recent-

retired in 1962 and sold for scrap in 1964. It was the last steam engine in Alaska, Scott Hicks, the president of the 557 restoration company, said.

Monte Holm saved the 557 from the scrap yard and brought it home to Moses

Holm rode the rails into Moses Lake as a youth, settled here, raised a family, ran a successful business. He had many different interests and collect-ed objects that reflected those interests, up to and including a

In its heyday the 557 was a familiar sight in Moses Lake, and its whistle could be heard all over town. She runs on steam and carried a runs on steam and carried a 100,000-gallon water tender for a handy supply. When he wanted to run the train, "Monte would fill the tender with a five-eighths-inch garden hose," Wayne Rimple remembered. It took about two weeks to fill the tank, Rimple said, until a friend suggested taking advantage of the fire department and its high-velocity fire hoses. Holm displayed several

of his finds in a museum he called the House of Poverty in Moses Lake. He had a little run of track, and ran the 557 now and then. Rimple remembered Monte derailing it once, and how it took four guys four or five hours to get it back on

Monte owned the engine Nonte owned the engine for 44 years, until his death in 2006. When his keepsakes were sold, longtime fam-ily friends Vic Jansen and Jim Jansen, of Moses Lake, bought the 557, then donated it to the Alaska Railroad, with the stipulation that it be restored to operating order.

The Engine 557 Restoration Company is a nonprofit group set up to work on the project. Their goal is to restore the 557 to her look in about 1950, when she was hauling freight and passengers throughout the Alaska Territory. The painting of the 557

depicts its run along Turn Again Arm, an inlet along the Alaska Pacific Coast. Artist Craig Thorpe, of Bellevue, said the train will run excursions along that route when it's restored. Thorpe said one of his goals is to show how rail transportation can harmonize with the existing landscape, he said.

The original painting is in the offices of the Alaska Railroad, Hicks said, and it could be used to raise money for the restoration. There were 557 prints made, and the prints will be sold as a fundraiser, he said. Prints are \$100 each.

The restoration is about 40 to 45 percent complete, Hicks said, with tests on the boiler scheduled for summer 2016, Thorpe said.



The port began to see the need to expand their wastewater facilities as they gained more indus-trial tenants and experienced an increase in the volume of wastewater runoff.

commissioners Port authorized the expansion project last year and estimated to cost about construction on a new \$2.6 million.

30-million gallon storage lagoon began in April. The expansion proj-

ect, which also includes installing pipelines to connect nearby facilities to the lagoon and upgrad-ing the current lift station and irrigation pump station, is expected to be completed by the end of November.
